Interesting Research

An article recently in the Applied Science section of the NY Times reported about a study from the journal Psychological Science that finds a person's ability to self regulate declines as the day wears on. If you are "cognitively tired" you may make poor decisions such as cheating, lying, or committing fraud. Experiments showed that taxing the part of the Brain responsible for "executive control" can impact decision making. The researchers were working with adult subjects and thinking of business models but this made me think of our students. Some have great mornings and much of our focused work is in the morning when we get the best effort and results. Other students have a slow wake up time and do better as the morning progresses and into the afternoon. Think about it!

ASAH Conference - Friday, November 14

ASAH is a not-for-profit organization of private schools and agencies in New Jersey which provide highly specialized services to more than 11,000 infants, children and young adults with disabilities. Founded in 1974, ASAH now serves more than 145 schools and agencies throughout the state Their Annual Conference was held on Friday, November 14th in Atlantic City. We were very excited that we had three Rock Brook staff members lead workshops at this event.

Mary Hayes, School Counselor presented with Elizabeth Casparian, of HiTOPS. Their workshop was on **Sexual Health for Special Needs Youth**. Information about typical sexual development and characteristics of sexually healthy adolescents and adults was shared as well as strategies and materials that best support parents and school personnel in addressing sexuality in special needs populations. This workshop addressed the need for inclusive, medically accurate and non-judgmental information about sexuality for individuals with special needs.

Liz Varall and Susan Campos, Speech Language Specialists hosted a workshop on **Participation Plans - A Model for Implementing Assistive Technology in the Classroom.** In this workshop, the document with specific examples of its usage and benefits was presented. Emphasis was placed upon the trans-disciplinary benefits of the Participation Plan, as its creation and maintenance relies heavily upon collaborative team approach of instruction.

Speech Department News

November is always a very special time of year. No matter how busy we are we take time to stop and be with friends and family for Thanksgiving. For our students, family is everything! At Thanksgiving time, families have the opportunity to make traditions and do fun things together that are so important for strengthening bonds between parents, children and grandchildren. We all enjoy routines and memorable events. For our students, rituals and routines become especially important!

Think about what you enjoy doing with your children at Thanksgiving and during the month of November. If you always make certain foods for the holiday, include your children in the preparation. For children who read, they can help tell you what is next in the recipe or what else needs to be purchased when shopping with you at the grocery store. For non-readers, you can make a word document shopping list or recipe with clipart images for your child to "read." Augmentative communication devices can be programmed to have the desired items listed and catch phrases such as "We need..." "Let's get..." or "Next add..." can be used before selecting a food item when shopping or making the recipe. AAC devices can be taken to the grocery store. Students learn that their device is their voice and that it can be used in all areas of their lives. It is powerful for children to be able to order what they want at a fast food restaurant all by themselves! These events build memories that they can talk about later.

Remember to take photos of special family events and family members. The whole family will enjoy sitting down together and looking at the pictures from time to time. Encourage your child to tell about what he likes to do with Grandma, Uncle Pete, or Cousin Sam. Help them to express feelings about events. "It was fun playing Uno with Pop-Pop on Saturday. I won!"

November and Thanksgiving are truly a special time of year. Thank you so much for all you do for your families. We are thankful for having the privilege of being a part of your lives and for sharing the wonder of your son and daughter with us every day at school!
