### **Continuing Education/ Training:**

Our Speech-Language Specialists attended the Annual American Speech-Language-Hearing Association (ASHA) Convention November 17–19, in Philadelphia.

The convention provides them the opportunity to learn about the latest research, polish clinical skills, improve techniques, and gain new tools and resources to advance professional development.

Additionally, I had the opportunity to travel to Massachusetts for two days of advanced training in Safety-Care at the QBS training facility. Safety-Care is the program we use here to provide staff with the skills to confidently, safely, humanely, and respectfully enhance the lives of children and adolescents who sometimes exhibit challenging behaviors.

Staff members are taught to intervene professionally and therapeutically, using a safe, straightforward, effective approach designed to prevent or reverse escalation. Safety-Care appropriately balances immediate crisis intervention and longer-term safety goals.

The advanced training included additional skills and strategies such as creating safety plans, managing student behaviors on vehicles. and specific techniques for working with children in preschool through grade 8.

The staff will be trained in these techniques in the upcoming weeks.

With the profits we were able to get the remaining Classroom Wish List Books.



## Speech Corner - By Catherine, Speech Student/Class 4

### How to communicate with your child using AAC

Augmentative and alternative communication (AAC) is a means by which some of our students express their thoughts, wants, or needs to support their verbal speech. AAC refers to any mode of communication, other than verbal speech, that is used to exchange information. It ranges from basic facial expressions, gestures, and sign language to more high-tech, electronic methods, such as iPads with communication software. Frequently, a combination of the above methods is used to support both language comprehension and production. The goal of AAC is to provide students who have limited verbal speech with a means to interact with others and express their wants and needs.

Despite familiarity with the definition of AAC and your child's device, incorporating it into your child's daily life may seem like a daunting task. However, research has shown that family involvement often plays a pivotal role in a child's success in learning and using his/her AAC device. Thus, seizing opportunities for your child to use his/her AAC at home and in the community can make a big difference! One way to do this is to model use of the AAC during routine or motivating activities. Begin by getting your child's attention. Next, pair a verbal message with selected icons on the AAC. Then ask your child a question so that he/she can respond with the message modeled on the AAC. For example, if you know your child wants to go outside to play, you can target the phrase "go out." First, get his/her attention. Next, select "Go" and "Out" on his/her device and say "I want to go out." Then ask, "Do you want to go out?" so that your child has the opportunity to select "go" or "out" on the AAC. This reinforces the use of the AAC as a way to communicate in a natural environment with positive reinforcement — getting to play outside!

This method of modeling is referred to as "Aided Language Stimulation." For more tips, search "Aided Language Stimulation."
