Many thanks to Ira Fingles, from Hinkle, Fingles, Prior & Fischer, who came to RBS last Thursday night. He spoke to us about special education law and specifically about the recent Supreme Court ruling regarding the SCOTUS Endrew F. case. Ira reminded us that the goal of education for all children is to be able to generalize skills in the home and community. The areas that all students are preparing for are to be good citizens; be employed; pursue further education and achieve independent living. For kids with IEPs the discussion is about the concepts of "appropriate" and "progress". In the past, an IEP was appropriate if it "sets out an education program that is reasonably calculated to enable the child to receive educational benefits". Many Federal Circuit Courts have ruled that these benefits only have to be "something more than trivial or de minimis" benefits. The Circuit Court for New Jersey and Pennsylvania have ruled that a student is entitled to a "meaningful" educational benefit, which is a higher standard than "something more than trivial." The Supreme Court's ruling rejects the "some benefit" concept and ruled that a program must "be reasonably calculated to enable a child to make progress in light of the child's circumstances." It challenges all of us to continue to assess a student's skill level and ability, and to continue to expect our students to be good citizens, be employed, seek further education, and live independently.

To continue providing high quality programming for your students, our staff participate in continuing education courses and professional development. As a school, we have a Professional Development Plan (PDP) and each staff member also creates their own. Staff are also observed throughout the school year.

During our recent staff development day, topics included dyslexia and other reading disabilities and the use of multisensory approaches to provide direct instruction. We also reviewed assessments, data, and how we document evidence of learning. We also spent time reviewing state required topics such as alcohol, tobacco, and other drug prevention and intervention, policies on student conduct, and procedures for early detection of abused or neglected children. Last, we also discussed the reporting requirements for the Electronic Violence and Vandalism Reporting System (EVVRS).

We look forward to more professional development in the upcoming school year!

"It's the Flu" ... Probably the last words anyone wants to hear this time of year. So what is the flu? Influenza (flu) is a serious disease caused by a virus. It is spread from person to person through respiratory droplets such as coughing, talking, sneezing, or touching others with contaminated hands or contaminated objects. The virus does not discriminate and even healthy children are at risk. These viruses can live up to 2 hours on objects like doorknobs, computer mouse, steering wheel, etc... Proactive steps to take include receiving the Influenza vaccine. The CDC recommends that all children aged 6 months and older get the vaccine, as well as adults. Other preventative actions are: frequent and good hand washing; keeping hands from touching eyes, nose, and mouth; cover mouth and nose when sneezing or coughing; no utensil or water bottle sharing. And as always, please keep children home when they are sick. Stay healthy for a safe and fun November!!







HOLIDAY SALE 11/10/17 (In school)




