Requirements for Restraint and Seclusion The NJ Legislature has just passed **new requirements** for all schools regarding the use of physical restraint and seclusion. Our Safety Care procedures are in line with the intent and requirements stated by this recent legislation. Information about Safety Care is provided in our parent packet and at Back to School Night.

As a school, we have found the Safety Care program and protocols to be an effective approach to providing the newest strategies to teach replacement behaviors and manage crisis situations. Katie Hardgrove and Chris Cruz are certified trainers and all staff are annually trained. An emphasis on positive behavior supports and interventions greatly helps deter the need for holds or seclusion events. While we have notified families via email or phone calls about holds or use of the break room, we will also be sending home copies of our Safety Care Reporting Forms that details what occurred. If you have any questions or concerns or would like a copy of the new legislation, please contact us.

RBS will then be CLOSED for ALL on 2/16 & 2/19 for Presidents' Day Break.



School Counselor Ms. G. Jessica Gosses, M.Ed., LPC



This winter Safety Patrol ran a fundraiser to help victims of Hurricane Irma. We sold popcorn from Popcorn for the People, an organization that provides jobs for individuals with autism. As a group, safety patrol discussed how we were helping others by selling the popcorn. We are continuing to learn about what empathy is and how helping others can make us feel good and happy. Empathy can be hard to explain in words; however it is an important skill for children to learn.

What exactly is it?

Empathy is the ability to understand and experience the feelings of others, and to respond in helpful ways. Children who are empathic will be better prepared to cope with conflict and difficult social situations. For some children empathy comes more naturally than for others. Research has shown that on average this is a skill that is not really fully emerging until about age 8-9 in a typical child. However, it is never too early or too late to help your child learn and practice empathy.

There are many ways to do this. Of course, modeling empathy is important, as is verbalizing what you are doing and why. Also describing how it makes you and others feel is important. If you break it down, there is a lot involved! Remembering to help your child identify emotions in self and others is key in order to be able to show empathy.

Speech Corner by Lisa Gagliastro, HS Room Speech and Language in the Community

Finding time outside of school to practice speech and language can be challenging, but luckily many goals can be targeted throughout a child's day. Here are some simple and effective strategies to help your child work on their speech and language on the go!

Read information. Look at signs and labels (store hours, aisle signs, nutritional facts) with your child and help them identify key information. When buying food, help your child look for a specific brand or flavor. At a restaurant, help your child locate his or her favorite meal on the menu.

Point out what you see and describe your senses, shapes, and colors. Continue to provide language models. Remember that children continue to develop with each and every bit of language exposure.

Teach new vocabulary about the environment. Reach out to your child's SLS to help create themed communication boards or vocabulary folders to match where you will go. It is a great time to learn vocabulary about food, weather, people, places, etc.

Find reasons to communicate. Encourage your child to communicate when the situation arises (ordering their own food, asking for help).

When grocery shopping, talk about what to buy, how many things you will need, and what you will make. Talk about sizes, shapes and weight. Encourage your child to show you what they want to buy.

At a restaurant, discuss different types of food and drink. Have a conversation while you are waiting for your food. Describe some things you might see at a restaurant (exit sign, bathroom sign, menu). Describe your surroundings: is it loud? Cold? Is the food delicious or yucky?

Ask wh- questions about their activities. Where did you go? What did you do? Who did you see?

Keep it simple. We don't want to overwhelm or make a task too challenging. In the community, we want to encourage language in the most natural way possible.
