Information about PSSDs...

Private Schools for Students with Disabilities (PSSD) in NJ serve more than 11,000 children ages 3-21 who have complex disabilities.

Federal and State Laws require all students with disabilities receive an appropriate special education at no cost to parents. Come to the workshop on 10/12 to find out more about the SCOTUS ruling on the meaning of the word "appropriate".

Public school districts place students with disabilities in private schools when the in-district programs cannot meet a child's needs.

Public Schools pay tuition; rates are set annually by the NJDOE. Districts pay a" per diem" or daily rate for each day school is in session. The daily rate is charged even if your child is absent as they are an enrolled student.

Many private schools in New Jersey are tax-exempt charitable organizations established for the benefit of the students they serve. (RBS is a 501(c)3).

We are all adjusting to the new 2017-2018 school year. Since RBS school times have changed, we would like all families to use the arrival and dismissal procedures listed below. Also if you have a child who normally takes the bus and you decide to drop them off or pick them up from RBS - it is your responsibility to notify your child's bus company.

MORNING DROP OFF:

The school day starts at 8:40 am. Students may start entering the school at 8:35 am. There is a designated parent drop-off and pick up section in front of the school between the dumpster and the second walkway. Please pull up to the car line behind the other parent cars. If there is not a space, please do not double park, but pull back around the circle until one becomes available.

AFTERNOON PICK-UP:

The school day ends at 3:00 pm. **Dismissal for parent pick-up starts at 2:45 pm**. Students will wait on the bench in front of the school /weather permitting. In inclement weather students will wait under the overhang. RBS does not have an aftercare program so **all students need to be picked up by 3:00 pm**.

Please be advised that in order for the RBS staff to account for the well being and security of every student at dismissal, staff will not be available between 2:40 - 3:00 pm. If you need to speak to a staff member directly please park your car in a visitor spot and sign-into the school. Thank you for your help.!!

Speech Corner - By Miss Mariya - Speech Classroom 2

Breaking the Barriers: AAC in the Water

Whether your child is at the beach, lake, or waterpark, in the pool or bathtub, or simply playing in the sprinklers or at a water table, communication does NOT and should NOT stop just because water or sand are involved. What can you do?

Creating a low-tech communication board that is waterproof and floats is a great option. Your child's Speech-Language Specialist is a great resource to reach out to help find target vocabulary that focuses on a variety of communicative functions, as well as create this board using your child's symbolset system. You can use Aided Language Stimulation (ALgS) and other spe-



cific teaching strategies (i.e., use AAC to model AAC language) to model and expand upon communication skills. Point to the symbols as you talk to your child, model its use, and encourage your child to use this board to communicate with you! Create many communication opportunities to use the board for multiple communication functions. These may include to gain attention (e.g., "look"), direct another person's actions (e.g., "go fast"), request by action (e.g., "want float"; "go up"), request by object (e.g., "want" + "noodle"), request assistance (e.g., "I want help"), refuse/reject (e.g., "stop", "all done"), request continuation (e.g., "more" + "splash"), take turns (e.g., "I go"; "you go"), comment (e.g., "I like"; "cold water"), etc...

Here are a few ideas on how to make communication continue to happen in these elements!

Materials:

Communication board (i.e., vocabulary represented as symbols) printed out on cardstock

Large baggie with zip lock seals (size needs to fit around the communication board)

Laminate (use a heat seal laminating machine)

Scotch heavy duty packing tape



Pick an option: foam garden kneeler pad: one with a cut out handle works best for the pool, rectangular Styrofoam plate, small kickboard, piece of cardboard around the same size as the high-tech AAC device, waterproof clipboard, or a baseball card holder sleeve.

Instructions:

Create and print the communication board. Laminate the sheet 2-3 times. Cut out board leaving an edge of ½ inch of laminate space around entire parameter to keep your board waterproof. After laminating, you have many choices: (1) Attach board to cardboard via packing tape and place inside zip lock bag. (2) Put board in baggie and seal pushing excess air out so it lays flat. Place baggie on whatever you are attaching board to (i.e., (choose an option from materials section) and use the packing tape to wrap multiple layers around entire baggie repeatedly in once piece without cutting tape to start again.)
