


Early Childhood Center (ECC)

Happy Spring from ECC! With the changing of the season and the arrival of warmer weather, our students have been busy exploring the differences between winter and spring, with a special focus on the amazing transformations that spring brings.

In celebration of Earth Day, the class had the perfect opportunity to reflect on all the incredible things the Earth provides us. This exploration has launched the students into an exciting science journey into photosynthesis, where students are learning how plants and animals support one another's needs—and just how important plants are for the air we breathe!

Our class will also be diving into the life cycle of plants, planting seeds of our own, and observing their growth over



time. In addition, students will explore how pollination plays a crucial role in the development of fruits and vegetables.

We're looking forward to all the hands-on learning and discovery this season has to offer. Spring has truly brought a new level of excitement and wonder to our ECC classroom!

Elementary Classroom

This month, students and staff celebrated Autism Awareness Month by having a wonderful guest reader, Ana, the sister of our amazing Speech Language Pathologist, Michaela Fibraio. To welcome our visitor, the students made a colorful poster filled with things Ana loves, creating a personal and cozy environment. The classroom had a YouTube fireplace crackling on the Promethean Board to make the room feel extra warm and inviting!

Ana read the class a beautiful story about how headphones can help people feel more comfortable and supported. The students loved it and listened so attentively!

After the story time, the students and staff shifted into a fun and festive Easter activity. Each student got to paint their own egg canvas while we played a game called, *"I'm Going on an Easter Picnic"* — adding foods to our picnic basket that began with each letter of the alphabet. It was such a joyful and creative day filled with learning, laughter, and lots of Easter spirit!





In addition, our incredible Elementary students held their very first school fundraiser — a Lemonade Stand for the school community! The kids worked hard mixing large batches of refreshing lemonade and pink lemonade. They also helped create colorful flyers to advertise the event and put together eco-friendly cups with reusable straws for all our thirsty customers.

To add a fun, personal touch, the students wrote cheerful puns on each cup like, *"Stay Zesty, Bestie!"* It brought lots of smiles and laughter!

Thanks to their hard work and enthusiasm, the class raised over \$160 to go towards an exciting spring/summer field trip. It was an incredible day of learning, teamwork, and success — we are so proud of them!







Movement Class:

In movement, students are participating in a unit that is focusing on *balance*! As students progress, they will benefit from increased coordination, increased core strength, improved posture, and bilateral coordination. Balancing has been shown to come with a variety of benefits. Many studies show that increased balance can influence decreased anxiety, increased focus and increased strength. Studies specific to autism have shown that posture can be significantly improved through training balance skills. We have started this unit by balancing pool noodles on our hands and have now moved on to balancing folders on top of the pool noodles while traversing varying terrain. For students who cannot access the alternative terrains, we have focused on grasping and accessing the same textures with our hands. Please reference the attached articles for further information.

Recorder and Ukulele classes are progressing nicely. Students are ready to try a new method for Ukulele, which will offer more opportunities for success in playing specific chords along with some familiar songs like the "Hello Song," "Goodbye Song,"

"Kookaburra," "Make New Friends," and an arrangement of "Somewhere Over the Rainbow." The students have greatly improved their ability to hold the ukulele and strum rhythmically.

In art, students completed some Spring projects. Using dot paints, students decorated Peep outlines. A few classes studied Vincent Van Gogh's "A Starry Night" painting and, using tempera paint markers, created their own "Starry Night" paintings. Students are in the process of creating decorations for our 50th Birthday Celebration, which is scheduled for Wednesday, May 14.

We continue to use a variety of rhythm instruments and explore rhythm patterns and various styles of music.

As a note, students are already practicing songs for our Graduation Celebration, in particular, "Working on my Independence," written by Rock Brook's own Jenie Vargas.

Security Drills: In April, students participated in both a fire drill and a bomb threat drill. We are pleased to share that our students continue to follow all necessary procedures with care and cooperation during these emergency drills. Their calm, attentive behavior reflects the ongoing efforts of our staff to ensure that safety protocols are well understood and practiced throughout the school community.

As a reminder, all schools in New Jersey are required to conduct two emergency drills each month—one fire drill and one security drill. Security drills may include scenarios such as active shooter, bomb threat evacuation, non-fire evacuation, lockdown, or shelter-in-place. In accordance with state regulations, schools must also notify families following each monthly security drill.
